The aim of this exercise is to begin thinking about how you use your money.

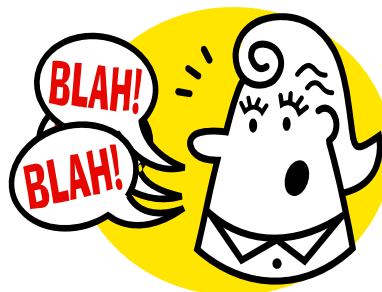

TASK 3

Is the Government Spending Wisely?

For this task we want you to consider whether the government is spending the country's money wisely.

On the next page is a diagram which shows you how the government currently spends the money raised from taxes.

We want you to produce a newspaper report giving your opinions and the opinions of others about how the government spends money- you could use a family member as an 'eye-witness' that you have interviewed after the budget has been announced.

TASK:

1. Look at the diagram on the next page
2. Where is the most money being spent?
3. Where is the least amount of money being spent?
4. Which sector do you think is the most important and why?
5. Write a newspaper report on how the government is spending money.
6. Include your opinion and those of others.



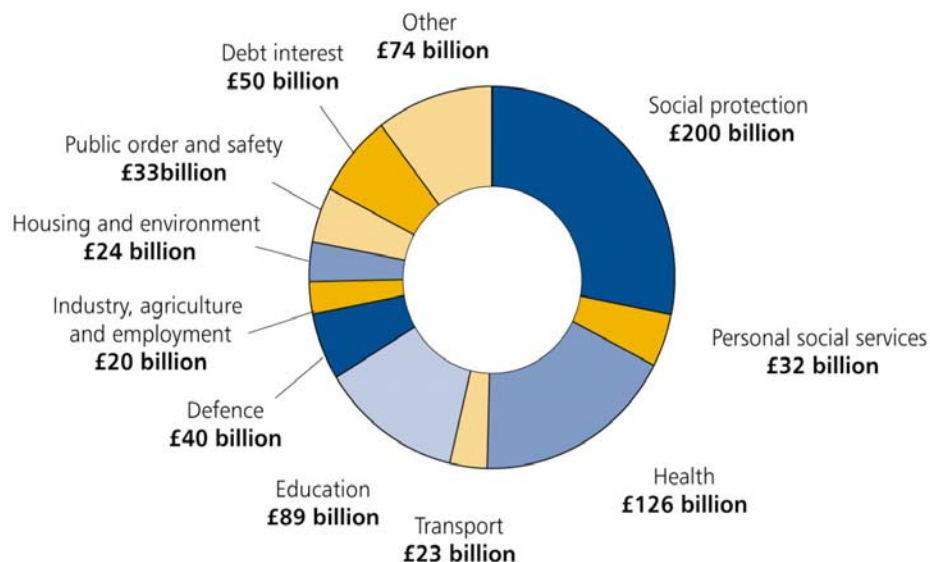
TASK 3 & 4

(Social Protection – formerly known as ‘Social Security’ and covers benefits of all descriptions.
Personal Social Services – family services, help for disabled etc.)

TASK 4:

1. Use a calculator or your phone to add up the total amount of possible government spending for 2011-12.
2. Re-draw the government spending chart and re-allocate the money as to how you think it should be spent – it must match the same total for answer number 1.



TASK 5

What are the banks for?

For this task we want you to find out about the kinds of services that banks offer and how people can use their services.

Your task is to design a leaflet that will educate teenagers about the services that banks offer – choose one bank. This could be the one that you use or that your parents/carers use.

Below is a list of things you should include, as well as a list of resources that you can use to find out information.

In your leaflet you should include:

1. The name and logo of the bank so that people can recognise it.
2. The location of the bank in the local area.
3. A list of services they offer and a description of what those services are.
4. How people can set up a bank account
5. Find out what the following things are:
 - a. Current accounts
 - b. Savings accounts
 - c. Any accounts that are specially designed for young people

RESOURCES:

The best way of finding out about these things is by visiting banks themselves – there are loads of them in town so go and visit them and talk to the people in the bank.

TASK 6

Am I spending wisely? – Let's see! 10

For this task you will need to refer back to your spending record.

TASK:

For each day look over your spending and ask:

- 1) Could you have saved a little bit of money by preparing – e.g. making sandwiches instead of buying them etc.
- 2) Whether you *really* needed / wanted the things you bought
- 3) Could you have bought them cheaper somewhere else?
- 4) Draw another table like the one on the first task. Add two more columns: one for 'possible savings' and one for 'necessary or not'. Fill in the table again adding the information for the two new columns.

At the bottom you could include how much money you might have saved.

- 5) Multiply your week's saving by 52
- 6) Now investigate what this total saving over one year could buy you.
